

Thank you to everyone who completed the latest community survey around our Knighton Way value of Angituu - Success. We asked the community for their thoughts of what Angituu/Success means for them and the role our kura can play in promoting and enabling our children to be successful. While there were a variety of responses, some common threads were:

BeachEd

As part of our swimming and water safety programme four senior school classes have attended beach education days at Wainui Beach, Raglan. Trained lifeguards from the Surf Lifesaving Club gave instruction on how to be safe both in and out of the water in a beach environment.
