Literacy

Our literacy programme continues to be adjusted to suit the different needs and abilities of A28 tamariki. We are focusing on a range of literacy skills that help us develop as authors. These include continuing to look at different ways sentences can be structured and how paragraphs are organised. As readers, we will be focusing on summarising and how we infer when we read by taking notice of the clues the writer has given us. This can then be carried over to our writing, where we will look at how we can leave our readers with clues to do some inferring of their own.

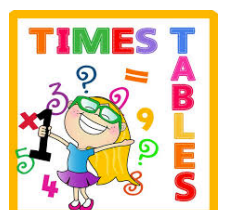

Mathematics

Cross-grouping continues this term. While all maths classes use Prime as a key resource, the focus in each class is different, so do take the time to ask your child about their learning. A great thing to do at home to help is to encourage your child to learn their times tables by heart.



Te Reo Māori

This term, we will be learning more about our whakapapa and learning phrases and responses that will enable children to communicate the location of an object or person. Encouraging them to then teach you at home would be fantastic!



Oral Language

The Senior Speech Festival is on at the end of this term. Our focus will be on speaking to an audience with confidence, and we will do this in a way that ensures each child gets to experience success.
